Term 2 is always packed with so much: examinations, Curriculum Day, work experience, GAT, report writing, sporting competitions, production rehearsals, Jazz Night, and the list goes on! None of this can occur without the enthusiasm and energy of our dedicated staff so I would like to firstly acknowledge the work that goes into making this work happen so seamlessly. This work is all designed to help all of our students see their talents and try something new.

The important issue of creating cyber safe communities was the focus of a Victoria Police presentation to Year 8s. Constable Williams encouraged students to remember that our communities, whether virtual or not, are held together by respect for self and others. I include some reflections from Sang Puia (aka SP)

Just say no if somebody asks you for nudes because they can send that to others... Don't share private information even if it's someone you get to know on a game. A girl shared that she was at a netball game and the location to a stranger who said he was 18. Lucky that she felt uncomfortable and told her dad (who was a policeman) and the 'stranger' was waiting for her. It turned out that he wasn't 18, he was 46 years old. You can always ask for help from the e-safety commission – they can take an image down and make you feel more safe. But if you don't like something said, just block them.

Semester Reports will be published in early Term 3 but with the rich ongoing feedback available through COMPASS, students are urged to discuss their learning progress with their families, and in particular exploring which strategies worked (or didn't work). This is healthy way to view assessment: as a method of witnessing personal growth and development, and an opportunity to celebrate learning. For those who completed their first exams, congratulations! It's the challenges that we remember and that really help us learn, so I join with all the teachers in urging you to see the feedback provided as encouragement for your next steps in learning.

We wish all staff and students a well-deserved break over the holiday period. Hoping you return feeling energised and recharged for Term 3.

Victorian Global Leaning Awards

I had the pleasure of attending the 2023 Victorian Global Learning Awards on Thursday 8 June with the college's International Student Program Coordinator, Shirley Luong.

Ringwood Secondary College received an award for the Homestay Family of the Year category. Helen Xing, one of the college's treasured homestay providers who offer care and accommodation to international students, won a commendation award, recognising her as providing one of the top 3 Victorian government school homestays for 2023.



Helen Xing and her husband, Hong, were both international students themselves 16 years ago and understand from first-hand experience the challenges and supports required for international students. Helen has provided homestay services to international students for more than 6 years.



Helen goes out of her way to help students adjust to their new surroundings, including the local Ringwood area. Helen and Hong ensure they celebrate cultural events with students to build connections and reduce home sickness. They hold family meetings where the students under their care are encouraged to share what's going on at school and in their lives. Helen is a registered nurse and has a strong focus on the wellbeing and physical health of all.

Health Information

We are now in the midst of winter and the symptoms of influenza (flu) can hit very quickly and may last several weeks. The Australian Government Department of Health and Aged Care has released information recommending influenza vaccination to protect yourself and others: <u>Annual influenza vaccination</u>. Flu vaccinations can be booked through GPs and pharmacies, many of which can also provide COVID-19 vaccinations.

All members of the school community are encouraged to practice prevention measures, including:

- washing and sanitising hands regularly
- avoiding touching eyes, nose and mouth with unwashed hands
- covering nose and mouth when coughing or sneezing
- staying home if unwell and consulting a general practitioner (GP) or <u>Nurse-on-call</u> as required

The 2023 COVID-19 booster dose is also available for everyone aged 18 and above. You can have your booster dose 6 months after your last dose or COVID infection. The Smile Squad team from EACH are coming to our school from 24th July 2023.

Smile Squad is the Victorian Government free school dental program.

This means all students can get a free dental check-up, preventive services, and treatment at school.

How to access free dental care

We need your consent before we can provide services. Consent is usually provided by a parent or guardian. Sign up to Smile Squad at: <u>xciting news wit</u> OR use the below QR code:



Please complete and submit the consent form, this will be sent directly to EACH.

Paper copies of the consent form are available. Please contact the school office if you would like to request one. The electronic consent form can be translated into more than 100 languages, and the paper form is available in 13 languages.

Smile Squad dental packs

All children deserve a healthy smile, and the Smile Squad free school dental program is working hard to help make sure this happens.

Your child(ren) will soon receive a free dental pack to bring home. The dental pack contains a toothbrush, full sized toothpaste, and an oral health brochure.

Please take the time to read the brochure. It's full of helpful hints and tips to help your whole family eat well, drink well and clean well – for life.

Smile Squad provides standard strength fluoride toothpaste that is generally used by ages six and over, unless recommended by a dental or trained health professional.

If your child is under six, please talk to a dental or trained health professional to find out if your child might benefit from using this toothpaste. You can also choose to put the toothpaste away until they turn six or give it to someone else in your family to use.

Do I need to attend my child's appointment?

No, you do not need to attend your child's appointment. You can attend if you would like to, and you can take your child to the community dental clinic if you prefer. EACH Smile Squad look forward to seeing you soon.

It is compulsory for students to attend, this will help ensure students get their preferred subjects and receive important information and advice for Year 11 subject selection.

RECONCILIATION WEEK WITH THE RSC KOORIE GROUP @ RINGWOOD TOWN SQUARE

On the 2nd of June, the Koorie kids of Ringwood Secondary, along with the wonderful staff who joined us, were able to travel to the Ringwood Town Square to celebrate and acknowledge Reconciliation Week with Maroondah Council and Mullum Mullum Indigenous Gathering Place. Upon arrival, we waited outside in the freezing cold, sitting on our chairs as we listened to the performers soundcheck.



The event started with a speech of introduction and a beautiful smoking ceremony. For the many who are aware what a smoking ceremony is, it is a spiritual tradition that we practise to cleanse the spirit. We burn varying natural ingredients that hold many different meanings, to create a large amount of soul cleansing smoke which we use to rid ourselves of bad spirits. During the ceremony, the elder who had set up the smoke, used clap sticks to let the ancestors know that we were there. As an indigenous person, I love my culture, but I struggle to connect due to my own personal history. Though smoking ceremonies are not uncommon, this particular one was my first. Being able to take part in a tradition that I had only ever seen in videos made me feel immensely happy and I am incredibly thankful for the experience.

After the ceremony had finished, we went back to our seats and watched as the many musicians performed. Performers included the local music group 'Yeng Gulli Mullum', the Eastwood Primary School choir and Kutcha Edwards. I particularly enjoyed listening to Kutcha Edwards because of his humour, as well as his amazing talent for singing and storytelling through the emotional expression of music.



When asked to describe the experience, a member of our group first used the phrasing "freaking awesome" before being reminded that this was for the school newsletter and changing it to simply "wonderful". I personally am very thankful for everyone who helped make this experience possible. The opportunity to connect to culture and to grow closer as a group will not go unappreciated. Thank you.
