- draw comparisons with other activities in their children's lives eg sport
- help them work through solutions

Student uniform update

The following student uniform policy amendments were passed by School Council and came into effect at the beginning of Term 3:

- One nose piercing permitted- clear or discreet stud allowed; no sleepers.
- Jewellery to be removed as required for safety reasons in the classroom or during sport.

A reminder that students are not permitted to mix the daily college uniform with PE uniform items.

Road safety around schools

The Maroondah City Council recently sent the following reminders for the college to distribute to the college community about Safety around schools, A road safety initiative:

Speed zones, pedestrian crossings and parking restrictions around schools are there to improve the movement of traffic during peak times and maximise safety for children and all road users. Parents/carers can help by obeying road rules and allowing enough time to drop off and pick up of your child.

Tips around schools:

- 1. Obey all traffic control signs and the directions of school crossing supervisors.
- 2. Plan with your child as to when and where they can be picked up or dropped off safely. Find locations where it is safe to get out of the car and cross the road.
- 3. Where available, always cross at a supervised school crossing even if it is further away.
- 4. Never call children from across the road.

An important message for parents of students currently in Years 10 and 11 at RSC.

This year the H&A committee is again offering two scholarships, each valued at \$500, to assist parents who are finding it difficult for their child to complete their VCE studies at RSC without financial assistance. If your student is commencing either Year 11 or Year 12 at RSC in 2024 and has had good results in previous years, you may be eligible for this support, subject to interview.

There are advantages for students who complete VCE, who will have greater educational and employment opportunities. This scholarship money can be used to offset the costs of fees, elective subjects, or additional materials for the student's chosen VCE course at RSC. The scholarship money may be split over both years if preferred.

Applications will close on Friday 20th October 2023 (Term 4, Week 2). If this scholarship could assist you, apply for your Scholarship Application Form from RSC by calling the college on 9870 2002 during office hours.

As there are two scholarships offered each year, representatives of the Heritage Committee will interview potential eligible students, following the application form being received at RSC by the due date. The successful applicants, commencing VCE in either Year 11 or in Year 12 in 2024, will be notified before the end the 2023 school year.

Interviews may be held either at the college or on-line, depending on the interviewers at that time. All applicants will be notified of the results.

CENTRAL AUSTRALIA 2023 by Chloe Year 10

On the 6th of July we all woke up before dawn, ready to leave for a 12-day trip to the Northern Territory. Most of us have not spent more than a few days away from our families camping and some of us had never even slept in a tent before. For others it was an area we knew nothing about. The first few days we all made lots of mistakes, I lost my drink bottle in the first 5 hours of being at Uluru, but we all worked it out in the end.



We got to watch the sunset at Uluru on the first day, which was just splendid. The cultural centre at Uluru taught us all so much about indigenous culture and a few people got souvenirs for their family.

A major highlight of the trip was Kings Canyon. We did the rim walk in the afternoon of the 3rd day. Most people would call this one of their favourites. The hike took around 3-4 hours and the Garden of Eden halfway through the walk was a lovely place to see.

At Alice Springs we got to visit Simpson's Gap and eat kangaroo tail, as well as learn about bush tucker. One day we had Rex the Snake Man come and visit us. It was so cool to meet the snakes and lizards that he brought. Some people were really scared, but we were all so proud that everyone tried to give them a hold. Rex was really fun, and we learnt about how Crocodiles will 'Hunt Us and Kill us!' On day 6, halfway through the trip, we had to do the big 11-hour drive from Alice Springs up to Daly Waters. We woke up at 3:30am. We finally arrived at Daly Waters at around 4:30pm, ready for our Pub dinners and our first night sleeping under the stars. The Daly Waters pub has so much personality it was definitely a big highlight for most of the people on the camp.

Throughout the trip we got to go on 3 cruises, one at Kathrine, one at Yellow Waters in Kakadu and the final one on the way to Darwin, which was a Jumping croc cruise. We were all very happy that we got to see a croc on every single trip. I learnt so much from the tour guides, I would absolutely recommend guided tours.



Once finally getting to the Top End, we got to swim for the first time. Mataranka Hot Springs was the first which was a very fun stop while driving to Kathrine, and then at the pools at the campsites. It must have been a bit crazy for the public to see all these kids rocking up to the pool. On the second last day we drove a few hours to Litchfield National Park and got to swim in Florence Falls. It was so nice and peaceful, and perfect place to be. It was definitely one of my personal highlights, and a great way to end the trip.

Ubirr rock was a night I will never forget. The sun setting over the open plains of Kakadu was wonderful, and the walk up to the rock had so much rock art to see. It was so cool to see the change in rock art throughout the trip due to the materials and animals that the Indigenous people had access to.

While it was a really sad day going home, we were all a little excited to go home. Homesickness had started a few days before, so it was a mix of both. It was the latest wakeup of the trip, and it was supposed to be a relaxing day. Unfortunately, it didn't really go to plan with delays and finally a cancelled flight. We finally got back to Ringwood at 11.15pm and were soon back in our own homes shortly after. I thoroughly enjoyed the trip and would highly recommend it to anyone.

Bedford Rd Closures


