## FROM THE PRINCIPAL



### **VALE Julie Hughes**

Julie was a well-liked and respected colleague who spent 14 years as Assistant Principal at Ringwood Secondary College, 2002-2016. Julie will be remembered for her kindness, sympathetic ear, love of coffee and cake, supporting her colleagues and overseeing programs that brought out the best in students. Her passing was sudden and we give our condolences to her beloved family and friends.

### **VALE Andrew Jacobs**

Andrew, an integral member of the Instrumental Music team at Ringwood Secondary and in neighbouring schools over many many years. He will be remembered for his talent, passion, energy and inclusiveness. His colleagues and students will remember his commitment, enthusiasm and contagious love of music. His passing was sudden and we give our condolences to his family and friends.

Andrew was one of our longest serving instrumental music teachers not only at our college but also in the government school system.

We are not sure of his commencement date, but he was here well before Rosemary Kenna arriving in 1996.

Besides teaching many generations of oboists and bassoonist Andrew has taken many concert bands over the years at the college and on Band Tour.

It is not only our school that has been greatly impacted by Andrew's passing but multiple schools. Andrew was the double reed specialist for the government system, teaching also at many schools over the years.

Andrew was also a talented oboist who played with many ensembles in Melbourne with the most recent being Melbourne Opera's Ring Cycle held in Bendigo earlier this year.

## Workforce Planning and Subject selection.

Planning for the 2024 school year is well underway. The first few steps of this long process have begun with staff submitting their intentions regarding time fractions and leave for the coming year. Students have begun to submit their subject preferences for the upcoming school year. These selections form the basis of decisions regarding which subject will and will not run in 2024.

## Attendance

Missing one day a fortnight is the same as missing 4 whole weeks of school a year. Being at school is your most important task for young people. Regular attendance builds habits that young people will take into adulthood. While it might not seem obvious, when students come to school, they are learning about more than just Maths and English. They're learning all sorts of skills like working in teams and meeting deadlines that will help in adulthood.

Being at school every day also means students are involved in their own learning, interacting with other students and teachers and are a part of environment that is motivating and stimulating.

There is also a lot of evidence that shows that young people who attend school more frequently have better outcomes after school too. This means they earn more money, have better job prospects, are less likely to misuse drugs and alcohol and are generally healthier.

### From Ms Fedrizzi

As shown in our annual Production, consistent quality performance under pressure is challenging but ultimately exciting. When we observe ourselves carefully and kindly, and reflect on the things that help or hinder our learning, we take control of our goals and really see improvement.

This is precisely what the progress reports and parent-student-teacher interviews endeavour to do. In the build-up to the Parent-Student-Teacher interviews, it is useful for students to use the progress reports to genuinely observe themselves and identify one key aspect to focus for improvement. The positive learning behaviours are valuable references here because they are not just about academic success but about learning habits. We encourage all students and parents to take the opportunity to either attend the face to face interviews at the school from 3.00 pm to 7:00 pm on Thursday 14th September or on-line from 10:00 am to 1:00 pm on 15th September. The bookings will open on September 7th so look out for the Compass News Feed.

Staff professional learning continues to delve into differentiation with staff in term 3 documenting newly designed activities and classroom experiences that build toward assessments so that staff can more accurately identify our students' knowledge and skills. Foundation House continues their work with us and on Tuesday 22nd August, presented their third session about how to teach and manage content with greater sensitivity.

Foundation House are an organisation that support survivors of torture and trauma and their pragmatic advice helps Ringwood as a community to connect and enable all of our students to flourish.

As a school, we are looking to improve our approach to assessment and reporting. We have conducted surveys and discussions with students, and on Tuesday 29th August at 5:00 pm is your chance to be part of the WebEx on-line discussion through our Parent Connect session for term 3. (see below for the log in or go to Compass News Feed) This discussion will identify the ways we can better connect with home to support the learning growth of all students. In term 4 we will bring the details together in a new reporting and assessment approach that will be communicated to all families and implemented in 2024.

During his time at RSC, science was his passion, but in Year 12 he had no plans for his future career, until he was encouraged to apply for a university position by his Year 12 Co-ordinator and teacher.

He attended university, where he completed many studies over many years, with qualifications in biological, chemical and physical hazards in the workplace, toxicology, contamination control, air quality control, micro-biology contamination of lakes, effluent contamination, medical waste management and microbiological hazard situations that have all required his skills.

He is a Doctor of Philosophy - PhD, Public Health, and also has other industry qualifications, and currently holds executive positions in organisations associated with health, medicine, and biosafety issues.

Brett told his Year 12 audience that he owes a lot to Mrs Jenny Ward, who urged him to go to university. He said he was so thankful for her persistence that has resulted in him being a high-achiever in his chosen science-related endeavours.

He was awarded a certificate by Mr Kain Gardner, science teacher; his name will be added to the RSC Science Hall of Excellence Honour Board.

## **RINGWOOD TRAINING**

### **WorldSkills Australian National Championships**

The WorldSkills Australia National Championships held 17, 18 & 19 August at the Melbourne Convention and Exhibition Centre.

A total of 470 young Australians have battled it out in Melbourne across 55 skills areas over three days for the chance to be named the country's top tradespeople, apprentices, and trainees.

The competition saw the best trainees and apprentices go head-to-head in high-pressure skills competition, Ringwood Training had five competitors compete in Sheetmetal & VETis Metal & Engineering. Ed H, Josh B and Clayton W (former RSC student) competed in the Sheetmetal category, with Clayton taking Gold medal as best Sheetmetal tradesperson in the country. Justin W and Nathan V competed in VETis Metal and Engineering category, with Justin taking Bronze medal.

Also involved, in addition to the competitors at the event, Shayne van der Heide as a Welding Judge and David Wilson as Metals Trades Convenor and Sheetmetal Judge.

The WorldSkills Australia National Championships are held every two years. The top Australian performers – the Skillaros – will now compete against 82 member countries for the title of the world's most skilled country at the 2024 International Competition in France. Unfortunately Clayton will not get the chance to represent Australia as a Skillaroo as Sheetmetal is not currently a trade category at International level of competition. Well done to all the RT team involved and Congratulations to Clayton and Justin.

## FROM THE MUSIC DEPARTMENT

Thank you to everyone who have supported staff and students alike during this very sad and difficult time with the tragic loss of our much beloved and respected double reed teacher and Symphonic Band conductor, Andrew Jacobs, in a fatal car accident over 2 weeks ago.

Andrew was a long serving member of our department, joining it in the mid 1990's, teaching many generations of oboe and bassoon students and conducting multiple ensembles, not only at our college but at many other state schools such as Blackburn High School, Glen Waverley, McKinnon, and Wantirna Secondary Colleges. He was also a freelance oboist and performed regularly with Melbourne Opera, with his most recent performance being the Ring Cycle in Bendigo earlier this year.

His impact on the wider community was evident at his funeral last Thursday at St Pauls Cathedral which was filled to capacity with friends, colleagues, students, ex-students, and musicians.



As mentioned by many throughout the past 2 weeks and at the funeral, Andrew was a kind, gentle and generous person, and he will be greatly missed by us all.

As a mark of respect, our Symphonic Band has decided to go through with their performance at the Victorian Schools Music Festival this Monday and will dedicate their performance to Andrew. This group of students have shown so much strength and compassion for each other over this difficult time.
